will be going out on Friday, July 7th, and within these will be information on the staffing structure for next academic year.


There will be an opportunity for you to discuss your child's report, should you wish to do so, with you child's teacher on Monday, July 10th, between 3.30 and 5.30pm.

From September, we are going to be changing the way we organise our dinner provision. You will no longer have to book a dinner for your child in advance; all we will need is the information on the day, and payment will be through Parentpay as before. If your balance does go below zero, then you will be sent a debt reminder through Parentpay (Make sure you set this up on your account) and we ask that you settle the amount promptly.

Please keep track of your Parentpay account in order to ensure that you have enough balance for the meals your child is having. We hope that the new system will be much more convenient for parents, and take away a lot of unnecessary stress after holiday periods.

Attendance



As you know, it is in the best interests of everyone that children attend as many school days as they possibly can. We will always contact parents or carers if we suspect the child is genuinely ill or if there has been a first aid concern that we feel needs further attention.

However, sometimes there is a grey area where we need to make a judgement as to whether or not the child is well enough to be in school. In this case, we may wait a while and see if the child will play happily with their friends at breaktime or eat their lunch without a problem. In this case, they may be feeling slightly under the weather but we would make the decision that they are well enough to stay at school.

The current guidance from the DFE clearly states that children should be able to attend school if they are suffering from minor ailments such as coughes or

colds, and also, you will appreciate that we, like you, sometimes have to make a judgement call when a child says they feel unwell and actually they mean that they are a bit fed up or anxious. If you suspect that your child is feeling these emotions rather than actually being genuinely unwell, then we will always work with you to investigate the issue further and work through the root cause of the anxiety.

I am always willing to support parents or carers with longterm medical concerns, in ensuring that children can attend school but ensuring that they can access medication and the curriculum is adapted to their needs.

I am proud to say that the attendance at Clare Community Primary School continues to be above the national average, and I know that with transparency and collaboration between the school and your-

selves, it will continue to reflect our joint commitment to delivering an excellent education to our children.
