Parent Survey

A big thank you to all the parents who used the Survey Monkey to respond to our latest survey. We were extremely encouraged by the positive responses we received with 94% of 61 parents and carers stating that their children enjoyed school; 97%

happy that their children were safe in school and 95% saying that they would recommend the school to another parent.

A key question was about whether or not we continue to rate attainment in all subjects in the annual school report. We had 46 responses to this question, and they were evenly split, so we will continue as we are as there was no clear favourite.

A number of parents have mentioned that they would like specific comments in Science which we will accommodate and we will be using bullet points to make comments about the foundation subjects in order to be more specific about individual strengths and weaknesses.

Holiday Requests

We are receiving a worryingly large number of requests for absence for holidays during term time. As of September 2013 the Headteacher can no longer legally authorise any holiday during term time. Leave in term time will not be agreed by us at any time unless circumstances surrounding the request can be evidenced, by parents, to be exceptional.

When children are absent from school, they miss key learning opportunities in lessons and children often find it difficult to catch up fully when they return. There are only 190 statutory school days in one year and 175 days (weekends and school holidays) available to use for holidays. Therefore every school day counts!

Attendance Policy

I would like to draw your attention to some changes to our updated Attendance Policy which has been amended to be in line with the Stour Valley Community School Attendance Policy. In particular, the following section lists specific actions that will take place should a child's attendance fall below 90%. See the whole policy on our website.

The category of Persistent Absentee is applicable to any pupil whose attendance, for whatever reason, falls below 90%. When this happens the school is legally obliged to discuss the case with the Education Welfare Officer to agree a plan of action.

- The attendance team will meet regularly to monitor attendance and parents will receive notification by email (or letter if they are not online) when attendance drops below 93% without a valid health reason.
- If a pupils attendance falls below 90%, and to try and avoid the involvement of the Education Welfare Officer, parents will be invited to discuss ways to improve attendance at school.
- Should the pupil's attendance then drop below 85% the Education Welfare Officer will insist that we request medical evidence* to support all future absences relating to illness. Failure to provide documentation will result in an unauthorised absence mark being recorded.
- A referral will be made to the Education Welfare Officer for either a Prevention meeting or a Fast Track Referral if attendance does not improve. In this case, parents will be invited to a meeting by letter.

Lastly, I would like to thank the vast majority of parents who support us in ensuring that their children attend school regularly, even when they have a cough or cold; and take their holidays during holiday periods and not in term-time. Ultimately, you are ensuring that your child is accessing the best possible education they can.
