

The clubs are now all up and running, and it is su-


per to see the children pursuing such a diverse range of interests as well as being motivated to consolidate their basic skills.

# **Accelerated Reader Update**

This intervention is going from strength to strength at school with an average of 10 months progress per pupil over the last 4 months. It is important to note that, as with all tools, the results that our pupils achieve with AR depend on what we do with it. When used casually, AR helps pupils reading abilities grow; when used thoughtfully and with proven techniques, it leads to tremendous gains and a lifelong love of reading. We continue to teach reading in school in a variety of different ways: through challenging, high-interest class readers which are linked to cross-curricular topics, through designated comprehension sessions where we explicitly teach reading skills, and through buddied reading sessions with pupils from several classes.

I would like to address some common questions I have been asked by a few parents in order to clarify the system and explain why it is successful.

#### Why is my child on an 'easier book' than before?

AR works by testing your child on their reading comprehension half-termly. This means that the child is not simply saying the words in the book, but that they have a thorough understanding of the language and the plot. They are then given a ZPD range based on their reading level. Children initially will be selecting from the lower range to ensure that they are able to get 100% on the quizzes they take on these books. If they do well on these first 2-3 quizzes, then they can work up the range and select from up to a couple of points above.

Example: A child's ZPD is 3.5-5.7. They should initially be picking books from 3.5-8; if they get above 85-100% on several occasions, then they can start moving up to 3.8-4.0, and so on.

We retest children half-termly so that we get the most accurate assessment of their comprehension skills.

## How is this going to improve their reading ability?

Research from thousands of schools world-wide shows that this method of improving reading works as long as children are reading for at least 30 minutes a day and getting at least 85% correct when quizzed on books. Basically, the more they read at their level of comprehension, the more that their reading ability will increase. This is why everyone in Years 2-6 begins every day with half an hour of individual reading.

#### What if my child wants to read a series of books and the books are on different ZPDs?

That is fine. Of course the child will want to read the whole series and there is no issue with occasionally dotting about the ZPD if a child wants to read a sequel to a book.

## Can my child still read their own books at home?

Of course they can and, if the book has a quiz on it (you can check this at home through ARbookfinder.co,uk), they can then complete a quiz for the book in school. Obviously, we would like them to read as many of their ZPD books as possible, as this is how they will improve their reading age, but we also want them to love reading! We have just invested £1300 in new books, and will be replenishing our stock on a regular basis to keep up to date and expand our selection of titles.

# **Breakfast Club**

Our Breakfast Club, which runs from 7.45-8.45am each morning is thriving, and we are delighted with the response from children and parents.

Do log on to ParentPay if you would like to book your children in for some repeat sessions, or simply use it for a one-off if you have an early start, making sure you book your child/children into the club before 3.00pm the preceding day.

A choice of sporting and craft activities are offered in the spacious school hall, before a nutritious breakfast is offered. The atmosphere is organised yet relaxed and the children attending transition very smoothly into the school day.
