


A Time for Reflection

Tuesday, December 3rd,





I would like to start my last newsletter of 2019 with a similar message to one I first issued two years ago, a term after I first joined the school. The primary league tables are about to be published and, as I wrote at the end of last year, until 2020, these statistics are not going to do our school any favours, due to an unfortunate cocktail of distorted data, historical turbulence, and a completely different curriculum from 2014, brought in partly to eradicate grade inflation.

In plain English, we do not show any progress because we believe that original assessments in certain year groups were misleading and inaccurate. I do not mean to cast aspersions by saying this; I empathise with the tremendous pressure put on headteachers and staff when results are displayed so publically- however, I am determined that you will have an accurate reflection of our school, its talented and lively youngsters and dedicated, conscientious staff.

Our in-house assessment systems are accurate and robust, thanks to regular Pupil Progress meetings and schemes such as Accelerated Reader. We knew almost exactly what our attainment was going to be this summer, and we can predict a very positive picture at the end of this academic year for both attainment and, finally, progress.

Cohorts can be radically different, which is why SATs results and trends can be so misleading in smaller schools— as any statistician will tell you. Despite maintaining consistency of teaching staff

and the curriculum over the past two years in Year 6, attainment has fluctuated due to different cohorts.

It is important to point out that parents of the last two Year 6 classes have been more than happy with results which they feel have accurately reflected their child's abilities and are a true representation of their skills and knowledge, but you may not be aware that over 10% of the class are not represented by the progress data. Similarly unrepresented are children who were diagnosed with SEND issues since January 2019.

I am extremely satisfied that our curriculum continues to harness the deeper and wider learning skills that are going to put in place strong foundations for sustained learning in secondary school. Stour Valley Community School, our main secondary destination, have consistently praised our children who go there as 'mature, high attaining pupils' with clear strengths in the basic skills.

Our growing roll speaks for itself; since January 2018, we have grown by over 11% so that we are now only a few places away from filling our pan of 210 children- that is amazing considering that when I joined the school our September figure was under 185. The consistent comments I get when I show prospective parents round the school are about our friendly and nurturing atmosphere, the politeness of our children and their eagerness to share their learning with visitors; the calm surroundings and the excellent behaviour they see in the classes.

Finally, OFSTED is recognising that a well-rounded curriculum is key to longer-

term educational success and improved life chances. We are definitely ahead of the game with the myriad of opportunities we offer for school trips, extra-curricular activities, and an exciting variety of learning experiences such as Mantle of the Expert projects, themed weeks and days, performance opportunities, partnerships with established and aspirational education providers such as the Royal Shakespeare company, opportunities for competitive sports, whole school community events such as the Art Exhibition, the list goes on and on...

So, we will stick to our principles because we can see the impact our school and curriculum are having on our young learners every day. They are enthused and immersed in their topics; they are proud of their achievements and proud of their school.

Every cohort is different and, at Clare, you can be assured that we know your child as an individual and will celebrate their strengths and encourage and support them in developing areas which they find more challenging.

Your children will look back on primary school as an enlightening and empowering experience and the start of their educational journey to success. We can promise you that we will always prioritise children's personal growth, long term engagement, wellbeing and development as learners over the limited scope of SATs test scores.

As a new Governing body we have now settled into our roles well. Some of us have previous experience of governance whilst others are new to the role, but I can reassure you all we have one thing in common, and that is we are passionate about education and providing the best education for your children.

So..... What do we do ..?

We ensure the vision, ethos and strategic direction of the school. We are aware of the financial performance of the school to make sure money is well spent and we hold our Headteacher and staff to account for the educational performance of our school and pupils. We also keen to support the whole school community to promote the well-being of both staff and children. We report regularly to the Stour Valley Educational Trust Board all of the above and we do all the above as volunteers.

We DON'T get involved in the day to day running of the school – we leave that to Mrs Loader and her team who are far more qualified to do that than us!!

This term Governors have been involved in various activities within school. Some Governors visit on a regular basis to listen to children read and get involved in class activities, others are involved in a Wellbeing programme with year six pupils. This provides a valuable additional resource to teachers and is always appreciated.

We have a group of Governors who undertake regular visits to the school site to ensure our children are kept safe and they work with the site management team from SVCS.

Recently Governors attended the school Open Morning. This was well received by potential new parents to the school and the Governors were very grateful to members of the School Council who happily took it upon themselves to conduct the tours around the school; after all, your children are far better at knowing about day to day school life!

Our termly monitoring visits are well received by staff. The children are very used to us appearing at their sides and are usually more than happy to show their work and chat about their learning. These visits are a great way for Governors to see the working school and enable us to have a first -hand overview of the curriculum which is an essential part of Governance.

In addition to the visits, we are working behind the scenes attending meetings, including progress and attainment and finance, reviewing school paperwork and policies, but the visits to the school to see your children enjoying their learning make it all worthwhile.
