


Maths Maestros

It is lovely to see how enrapt the rest of the school have been during these assemblies— they are a good introduction to the topics they can look forward to higher up the school.





In English (one of our favourite topics) we are learning a huge amount of sophisticated punctuation including dashes, colons and semi colons. We are also doing a lot of big write work with our head teacher Mrs Loader- at the moment we are doing evacuee letters and autobiography.

We are progessing massively in French with Mr Davies by describing local places in Clare such as the park, the school, the doctors and the churches. Also we are learning the alphabet in French. In P.E we have our eight year six house captains and our four house charities. Green team is cancer re-
